We have audited the financial statements of KATSINA STATE WATER BOARD Which comprise the Statement of Financial Position as at 31<sup>st</sup> December, 2021, and the Statement of Financial Performance for the year ended and a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory notes to the financial statements.

#### Responsibility for the Financial statements

The Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with Statements of Accounting Standards applicable in Nigeria and provision of the laws that established the institute. This responsibility includes: designing, implementing and maintaining internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error; selecting and applying appropriate accounting policies; and making accounting estimates that are reasonable in the circumstances.

# AUDITED FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31st DECEMBER, 2021 NOTE 1 STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The following are the significant Accounting Policies adopted by the Board in the preparation of its Financial Statements

#### 1. Basis of preparation

The financial statements of the Board for the year ended 31<sup>st</sup> December, 2021 has been prepared in in accordance the International Public Sector Accounting Standards (IPSAS) as issued by the IPSAS Board, and adopted by the Financial Reporting Council of Nigeria, as at 1<sup>st</sup> January, 2016.

#### 2. Basis of measurements

The financial statements values are presented in Nigerian Naira (4), which is the functional currency of the board and also prepared under the historical cost convention.

#### 3. Use of estimates and judgements

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with International Public Sector Accounting Standards requires management to use judgment in applying its accounting policies and to make estimates and assumptions about the future.

#### 4. Property, Plant and Equipment

All Property, Plant and Equipment are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation and impairment losses. Cost includes expenditure that is directly attributable to the acquisition of the items. When significant parts of Property, Plant and Equipment are required to be replaced at intervals, the Board recognizes such parts as individual assets with specific useful lives and depreciates them accordingly. Likewise, when a major inspection is performed, its cost is recognized in the carrying amount of the plant and equipment as a replacement recognition criterion are satisfied. All other repair and maintenance costs are recognized in surplus or deficit as incurred. Where an asset is acquired in a non-exchange transaction for nil or nominal consideration the asset is initially measured at its fair value.

#### a) Subsequent costs

Subsequent costs of property, plant and equipment are measured using the cost model. Accordingly, the board measures its property, plant and equipment subsequent to initial recognition at cost less accumulated depreciation and impairment losses.

#### b) Depreciation

The straight-line method is adopted to depreciate the cost less any estimated residual value of property, plant and equipment over their expected useful lives. The board estimates the useful lives of property, plant and equipment in line with their beneficial periods. Depreciation commences when the asset is ready for use i.e., when it is in the location and condition necessary for it to be capable of operating in the manner intended by management. Depreciation is charged at rates calculated to allocate the cost or valuation of the assets less any estimated residual values over their remaining useful lives thus:

c) Asset class	Estimated useful lives

The residual value, useful lives are adjusted prospectively, if appropriate at the end of each reporting period.

#### d) De-recognition

An item of Property, Plant and Equipment is derecognized upon disposal or when further future economic benefits are not expected from its use or disposal. Any gain or loss arising on de-recognition of the asset (calculated as the difference between the net disposal proceeds and the carrying amount of the asset) is included in the surplus or deficit when the asset is derecognized. Depreciation ceases at the point at which an asset is classified as held for sale.

#### 5. Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and Cash Equivalents include cash in hand, short term deposits held with banks, other short term highly liquid financial assets with original maturities of three months or less, which are readily convertible into known amount of cash and are subject to insignificant risk of changes in value. Bank overdrafts are shown within borrowings in current liabilities on the statements of financial position while bank overdrafts that are repayable on demand form an integral part of the entity's cash managements are included as a component of cash and cash equivalents for the purpose of the statement of cash flows.

#### 6. Inventory

Inventory is measured at cost upon initial recognition to the extent that inventory was received through non-exchange transactions (for no cost or for a nominal cost), the cost of the inventory is its fair value at the date of acquisition. After initial recognition, inventory is measured at the lower of cost and net realizable value. However, to the extent that a class of inventory is distributed or deployed at no charge or for a nominal charge, that class of inventory is measured at the lower of cost and net realizable value. Net realizable value is the estimated selling price in the ordinary course of operations, less the estimated costs of completion and the estimated costs necessary to make the sale, exchange, or distribution. Inventories are recognized as an expense when deployed for utilization or consumption in the ordinary course of operations.

#### 7. Foreign currency transactions

The board functional currency is the Nigerian Naira. The Financial Statements are presented in Naira, rounded to the nearest Naira. Transactions in currencies other than the Naira are initially recorded in the functional currency spot rate at the date the transaction first qualifies for recognition. Monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies are retranslated at the functional currency spot rate of exchange ruling at the reporting date. Differences arising on settlement or translation of monetary items are recognized in surplus or deficit.

Non-monetary items that are measured in terms of historical cost in a foreign currency are translated using the exchange rates as at the dates of the initial transactions. Non-monetary items measured at fair value in a foreign currency are translated using the exchange rates at the date when the fair value is determined. The gain or loss arising on translation of non-monetary measured at fair value is treated in line with the recognition of gain or loss on change in fair value in the item.

#### 8. Employee benefits – Pensions, gratuity and other post-employment benefits

The board is 100% owned by the Katsina State Government which seconded to the board most of its current staffing. Accordingly, the Pension and Gratuity of such employees are payable by the State Government and the board does not have nor does it accrue any such liability in its Financial Statements. However, there are some category of staff who employed on casual basis. These employments are governed by agreements between the board and the casual staff, at the moment no plan benefits are set aside for these set of employees.

#### 9. Provisions

Provisions are recognized when the board has a present obligation (legal or constructive) as a result of a past event, it is probable that an outflow of resources embodying economic benefits or service potential will be required to settle the obligation and a reliable estimate can be made of the amount of the obligation. Where the board expects some or all of a provision to be reimbursed, for example, under an insurance contract, the reimbursement is recognized as a separate asset only when the reimbursement is virtually certain. The expense relating to any provision is presented in the statement of financial performance net of any reimbursement.

#### 10. Revenue recognition

#### a) Recurrent Subventions and Capital Grants

Recurrent Subventions and Capital Grants are obtained from the State Government based on budgetary allocation. Recurrent subvention finances staff salary costs and overheads while Capital Grants are slated for specific projects. These are recognized when control of the related cash by the board is established.

#### b) Transfers from other Government Entities

Revenues from non-exchange transactions with other Government Entities are measured at fair value and recognized on obtaining control of the Asset (Cash, goods, Services and Property) if the transfer is free from conditions and it is probable that the economic benefits or service potential related to the Asset will flow to the board and can be measured reliably. These include grants and endowments received from other donors and are recognized when control over the cash is established or where conditions are attached to the Grants, when such conditions are fulfilled.

#### c) Other Income

These are recognized when the right to receive financial benefit or service potential is established.

#### 11. Overheads and other Expenses

Expenses are recognized in the Statement of Financial Performance when decrease in future economic benefits relate to a decrease in an asset or an increase of a liability has arisen that can be measured reliably. This means, in effect, that recognition of expenses occurs simultaneously with the recognition of an increase in liabilities or a decrease in assets. An expense is recognized immediately in the Statement of Financial Performance when expenditure produces no future economic benefits or when, and to the extent that future economic benefits do not qualify, or cease to qualify, for recognition in the statement of financial position as an asset.

#### 12. Changes in Accounting Policies and Estimates

The board may recognize the effects of changes in accounting policy retrospectively. The effects of changes in accounting policy are applied prospectively if retrospective application is impractical. The board recognizes the effects of changes in accounting estimates prospectively by including them in surplus or deficit.

#### 13. Related Party Disclosures

The board regards a related party as a person or an entity with the ability to exercise control individually or jointly, or to exercise significant influence over the agency or vice versa. Members of Katsina State Executive Council, Members of the Governing Board and key management\principal officers are regarded as related parties. Information and business relation with related parties are disclosed.
